## The Bill of Rights and the Trial Process Key Terms

<u>Judge</u> – acts as a legal referee to ensure that proper trial procedure is followed, and issues rulings on points of law. In a bench trial, the judge gives the verdict in place of a jury.

<u>Jury</u> – present if demanded in a civil case, and present in a criminal case unless waived by the defendant

<u>Plaintiff</u> – in a civil case, the person who files the complaint

<u>Defendant</u> – person against whom a civil or criminal complaint is filed

**Defense Attorney** – the lawyer representing the defendant

<u>Prosecutor</u> – in a criminal case, the lawyer who acts as the legal representative of the people of the State in prosecuting the accused defendant

<u>Witness</u> – gives testimony relating to the case during the trial

<u>Court Reporter</u> – records every word spoken during the trial on a stenograph machine or a recording device

<u>Deputy Sheriff or Bailiff</u> – keeps order in the court, guards defendants in criminal cases and maintains custody of the jury

<u>Clerk</u> – maintains the court's docket, court orders, and exhibits during a trial

<u>Police</u> – entrusted to serve and protect the public, to control and prevent crime

- a. <u>First Responding Officer</u> the first officer who responds and arrives at the scene of a call requesting police assistance
- b. <u>Investigating Officer</u> the officer assigned to investigate a criminal case
- c. Arresting Officer the officer who makes the arrest of the accused
